# Covid-19 Behaviour Tracker Insights on vaccinations Global review



May 14th to June 4th 2020


YouGov has teamed up with public health experts at the Institute of Global Health Innovation (IGHI) at Imperial College London to help health professionals across the world limit the impact of the disease. The ongoing survey runs in nearly 30 countries and provides insights on behaviours in different populations as a result of Covid-19.

This report looks at behaviours and perceptions around routine vaccinations during the Covid-19 pandemic. It uses the latest available survey responses for each country **between May 14**th **and June 4**th **, 2020** (exact survey dates for each country included are available in page 5). #### HAVE PEOPLE MISSED THEIR VACCINATIONS DUE TO COVID-19?

Most people have no household member missing or delaying getting any vaccines because of COVID-19

Has anyone in your household delayed or missed getting any vaccines because of COVID-19? This could be someone living in your home. (%)




8 in 10 people have household members who have not missed or delayed their vaccinations (78%)

Only 8% reported household members delaying or missing vaccines due to COVID-19

## Country breakdown shows large variations across countries in terms of vaccination rates

Respondents in most European and North American countries were not affected

LMI countries reported more delays or missing vaccinations due to COVID-19

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


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### HAVE PEOPLE MISSED THEIR VACCINATIONS DUE TO COVID-19?

The largest category of people unable to get vaccinated because of COVID-19 were the survey respondents themselves

Who in your household delayed or missed getting vaccinated because of COVID-19? %




8% of respondents stated they or someone from their household had delayed or missed getting vaccinated due to COVID-19. Of those:

- one third (32%) were not able to get vaccinated themselves
- 20% were babies (0-23 months)

#### WHY HAVE PEOPLE MISSED THEIR VACCINATIONS?

The most common barriers to getting vaccines during the pandemic are the recommendation by a healthcare provider and concerns about getting COVID-19 at the clinic

What is the main reason that COVID-19 made you or someone in your household delay or miss getting vaccinated? (%)



12% of respondents missed or delayed their vaccination on the advice of a healthcare provider or due to fear of contracting COIVD-19 at the clinic

11% of respondents missed their vaccination due to their clinic being closed or not giving vaccines due to COVID-19

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


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### WHY HAVE PEOPLE MISSED THEIR VACCINATIONS?


There is significant variation across countries in the share of respondents that missed vaccinations due to worries about getting COVID-19 by leaving the house or due to recommendations by healthcare providers

Percentage of respondents by country citing worry about getting COVID-19 by leaving the house as the main reason for delaying or missing vaccinations



Of respondents that missed or delayed vaccinations, the country that had the highest share of people that cited as the main reason "worrying about getting COVID-19 by leaving the house" was Saudi Arabia at 20%

Percentage of respondents by country citing recommendation by a healthcare provider as the main reason for delaying or missing vaccinations



Of respondents that missed or delayed vaccinations, the country that had the highest share of people that cited as the main reason "recommendation by a healthcare provider" was Spain at 24%

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


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### WHAT WOULD MAKE PEOPLE FEEL SAFE GETTING VACCINATIONS?

Two actions that vaccination clinics can take to help people feel safe: having enough face mask and gown supplies for staff and requiring people to wear face masks when at the clinic


What should vaccination clinics do to help your household feel safe getting vaccinated during this time?



Over half of all respondents reported feeling safer getting vaccinations if protective equipment were worn by everyone at the clinic (especially staff)

Almost half of respondents would feel safe if there were designated times for healthy people to get their vaccinations

Percentage of respondents by country who cited feeling safe getting vaccinations if all staff had enough protective equipment



In 22 of the 23 countries surveyed, over 45% of respondents would feel safer getting vaccinated during this time if clinics had adequate protective equipment
